


If you can, please come at 6 pm to help set up tables and chairs.


September Full Moon Labyrinth Walk

Notes from the President President, Board of Trustees Jevry Hutton

September 2018



We received an updated status report from the 2020 Study Group II and commended the members for their dedicated and thorough study of proposals to expand the physical structure of our Congregational Building. The Board considered the Group's recommendations for initiation of a capital development plan to permit expansion of the building to provide for additional classroom and storage space in a manner to support possible addition of a second story in the future. In recognition of the need to gather information necessary for continuing the project when it is deemed necessary, the Board approved their request of \$3,000 for an engineering structural design and agreed to develop a timeline for such expansion.

However, the Board determined that no actual construction or fundraising for such capital expansion would occur this year. We were particularly concerned that the new Director of Religious Edu-

cation should have the opportunity to provide input as to future physical needs for this vital program. During the next year, we will be working with all components of the Congregation to gauge their needs in developing growth projections and objectives. Of course, any capital expansion proposal would be subject to approval at a meeting of all UUCF members.

In serving as a delegate to the last UU General Assembly in Kansas City in June and meeting over the summer with Board members from several local congregations, I have been struck by how fortunate we have been with our recent growth. Many of the people I talked with were envious of some of our growth challenges since they have been faced with declining membership. The Board will do its best to focus on meeting future demands in a fiscally responsible manner to address all aspects of UUCF's mission.

We are excited to welcome Rev. Carl back from his sabbatical and are grateful that he was able to make himself available during the summer but hope that this did not detract from his study goals. The unfortunate removal of our Black Lives Matter banner and unsettling political environment only accentuates the need for actively pursuing the principles of Unitarian Universalism and our mission statement. While this will be a challenging year, with your continued support, we are confident it will be a productive one.


Beloved Conversations Returns this Fall

The Split Plate Offering on September 16th is for "I Believe in Me, Inc.," an organization that provides after school help, guidance, recreation and adult companionship for youth in Frederick. The CEO of I Believe in Me, Mr. Aje Hill, has personal experience with the tough choices that face kids today. As a young man, he found himself deeper and deeper into decisions that had him in trouble with the law and eventually he ended up in prison on a drug distribution charge. "While incarcerated, Aje realized that he no longer had control over his life and admitted that his life had become unmanageable. Through the pain, the hurt he caused his family and himself, and the loneliness he faced behind bars, Aje decided to do one of the hardest things in life; change. He decided to no longer be a menace to society; but with strong family support, love of God, and many support groups, to become a productive member of society. Since becoming a positive and productive member of society Aje also has added to his educational resume by gaining an AA in Business Administration at Strayer University in 2015.

I Believe in Me caters to underprivileged youth from the ages of 6-16. In existence since 2016, the program currently has 54 young men and women involved. His mission is to provide opportunity for our youth, whereby they are the objects of, rather than the subject of their own future and present reality. They are provided with the resources that for various reasons, much out of their control, have escaped them at this juncture of their short lives. Participants of the program are encouraged to seek the other less often traveled path as they awaken to a world of challenges and opportunity. The program offers the youth with an opportunity to obtain academic assistance, anger management, peer building skills, nutritional and hygiene guidance as well as participate in outreach programs offering the youth with opportunities outside of their current socioeconomic statuses.
