

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Building Your Own *Ethics*Spring 2017

- · Consider your beliefs, values and convictions in light of ethical dilemmas in dialogue with your classmates.
- · Are you **consistent** in your ethical framework? (Why or why not?) (Is consistency a virtue or vice?)
- Is there a pattern (logic/reason/emotion) underneath your reactions/decisions?
- Do you find yourself **changing** from your initial "gut" reaction through the discussion process. (Why or why not?)

Covenant

- Use "I" statements: speak from your own experience.
- Ask permission before sharing other participants' stories outside the group. (And they have permission to say no without giving a reason.)
- "Lean in, Lean back": Be conscious of your level of participation. Allow everyone a chance to speak before you speak again.
- You always have permission to "pass."



Credo: "This I Believe" (500 words)

- What have you clarified for yourself about your spiritual journey? (autobiography)
- What do you know based on your reason and experience? (liberal turn)
- How would you describe God/Spirit/Sacred/(Ultimate)Reality? (theology)
- How your the theology you have built "interfere" with your life? (What difference does it make in the way you live? What are the main obstacles in living your convictions? What concrete steps might you take to bring your life into line with your theology? What will you do differently because of BYOT?) On what are your ethics based?
- How would you describe human nature (theological anthropology)?
- How would you define/describe what is religion/religious for you?
- What is the purpose of (your) life or of the universe? (so what?)
- What will happen in the end? (eschatology)
- What stories/quotes/comments/insights from this class have been particularly meaningful/memorable for you?

- Religion is on the decline in America as many people leave behind traditional religious practices.
- What appears to be a decline may signal a major transformation in how people understand and experience God.
- The distant God of conventional religion has given way to a more intimate sense of the sacred that is with us in the world.
- This shift, from a vertical understanding of God to a God found on the horizons of nature and human community, is at the heart of a spiritual revolution that surrounds us – and that is challenging not only religious institutions but political and social ones as well.



Credo:

"Pluralism, Progressivism, Pragmatism" Sources of Authority

- I believe we should balance
 - the wisdom of the world's religion traditions
 - with reason, the insights of science, and our own firsthand experiences.
- (Rationalists need to be challenged by mystics and vice-versa.)

Credo: "Pluralism, Progressivism, Pragmatism" Theology

- "God" is a word in human language ("God is not 'God's name.")
- "I am interested in the 'event' playing itself out underneath the word 'God'" (Caputo).
- If "God is a verb," perhaps we should be talking more about 'godding,' as something one does or experiences — more becoming than Being.

Credo: "Pluralism, Progressivism, Pragmatism" Ethics

- Behavior is believable.
- Practice makes permanent, not perfect.

Credo: "Pluralism, Progressivism, Pragmatism" Anthropology

- Homo sapiens sapiens are not "a little lower than the angels," but rather a "little higher that the apes"
- and deeply interconnected with other life forms and the larger ecosystems of this planet.
- Accordingly, we need to increasingly part reorient from speciesism to interdependence.

Credo: "Pluralism, Progressivism, Pragmatism" Ecclesiology

- We need a better "conveyer belt"
 - Ego-centric
 - Ethno-centric
 - Globo-centric
 - Cosmo-centric

Credo: "Pluralism, Progressivism, Pragmatism" Eschatology

- No Perfect Past to which we can return (stories of exemplary lives and communities can still inspire us).
- No Perfect Future (choose love, trust, & hope anyway)
- No Single, Perfect Way (look for touchstones such as tradition, reason, and experience)
